### General Junior Vegetable Rules

1. Open to exhibitors ages 12 & younger.
2. When bringing entries in, use Vehicle Gate "A" (the UPS Delivery Gate) at the south end of the Agri-Center Parking Lot (Route 62, South Park Avenue).
3. When and where possible variety names should be included to help educate the consumer.
4. To minimize errors, exhibitors must affix the correct entry tag with the exact variety name written on the front, securely to every entry. If an article is not brought in, the entry tag for that article must be returned to the Superintendent.
5. Exhibitors are allowed only one entry in each class, except in classes 50 & 104 where 3 entries are allowed.
6. All perishable produce becomes the property of The Fairgrounds and will be donated to the local food pantry at the end of the Fair.
7. Cauliflower must be trimmed by the exhibitor.
8. Sweet corn must be picked from the stalk, a strip of husk removed. Do not strip entire ear.
9. Onions must be clean (dried or cured) but not peeled.
10. Exhibitors should remove stems from tomatoes.

## SECTION B – POTATOES

Instead of awarding premiums on a large number of varieties, potatoes will be shown in groups, the varieties in each of which are similar. All varieties listed under each group will compete against each other. Each group and variety should be prominently labeled. A plate shall consist of 5 tubers.

**Characteristics desirable in selection samples.** In judging each sample the following characteristics will be taken into consideration and in scoring them they will be rated according to the following percentages:

<b>Freedom from tuber disease and blemishes</b>	30%
<b>Uniformity</b> (all physical character considered)	20%
<b>Trueness to type</b> (skin, color, eye and shape) Characters of variety	25%
<b>Quality</b> (smoothness and brightness of tuber, general appearance)	15%
<b>Sizes</b> (8 to 12 ounces preferred)	10%

Preparation of sample. Potatoes for exhibition should be cleaned with a soft brush or by very gentle washing, so as not to break the skin or remove the typical characteristics shown by the skin.

3. Vegetables do not need to be grown by the exhibitor.

6. Items may be picked up on Monday, August 23<sup>rd</sup> between the hours of 7:30 AM and 9:00 AM. All products not picked up between those times will be disposed of.
